


God the Father called

Hope and of Love.





Despite the fact that leprosy is a **curable disease**, many lepers continue to live in the most remote areas of the jungle without access to medical attention needed to overcome the disease.

In a modern society like the U.S., advances in medicine bring us a clear understanding of leprosy. We know that the Hansen's virus of this disease cannot survive outside the blood; therefore the virus cannot live in fruit, vegetable, or utensils.

However, in remote villages in Vietnam, misconceptions about the disease abound and products from leper villages are routinely shunned because of the fear of contracting the disease.
